Bottlenecks and Challenges within the local and state systems that result in service barriers or failure to secure housing including risks and issues that will slow down or reduce housing stabilization

Coordinating with AHD to ensure data quality and data completeness at EOC sites; in which, will be reported to FEMA for reimbursements.

Identification of resources within AHD that can be leveraged to support the facilitated exit strategy - i.e. HUD funding, alcohol tax and AHD operating dollars

Coordination/communication across needed entities at local and state level for specialized behavioral health and medical services: progress underway with AHD and SOA

- Resource/ capacity constraints with behavioral health, care coordination, etc.
- Dissemination of tools/programs at a State and local level that will assist with housing
- Hospital discharges to shelter without additional services to meet client

Bottlenecks & Challenges: March 2022

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Availability and accessibility of affordable rental units, assisted living home beds and supportive housing beds

- Vacancy rate for apartments accessible to individuals experiencing homelessness (units available in income range at limited vacancy rate)
- Ramp up of Landlord Housing Partnership efforts now that contracts are completed
- Units that allow pets
- Access to funds that permit leasing up quickly
- Rapidly updated list of landlords who are willing to rent to those in mass care
- ALH that will accept clients without an approved Medicaid waiver

Data Quality & Data Completeness

THE DATA TELLS OUR COMMUNITY STORY

- Data quality has components of Data Timeliness (~within 5 days), Data Completeness (~95% of required data elements)
 - Data Completeness is important because unless data are known and entered into HMIS, it is impossible to complete system evaluation and strategic planning to improve client services and end homelessness
 - Information guides homeless services policy and decision-making at the federal, state, and local levels
- Some providers do not have a Coordinated Services Agreement with the EOC; therefore, their data is not included in AHD's FEMA reports
 - Salvation Army family hotel stays (Guesthouse and other locations) from 3/22/20-6/30/21 will not show on the FEMA report
- Mass Care Data Gaps
 - Guesthouse has had no client data entered since Guesthouse became part of the EOC Non-congregate Shelter AKHMIS project 7/1/21
 - A staff member from Bean's Café is being trained on data entry
 - Sockeye no data entered since program-initiated late September 2021
 - In process, AHD identifying staff personnel to enter data
- Things that delay telling our story
 - Not requiring HMIS data entry with funding
 - Providers not following the data quality standards
 - Providers not communicating changes in staff, programs, funding, and beds/rooms available
 - Initial programs/ New providers unable to discuss with ICA new program and/or provider specifics
 - Unable to capture data points required ie service animals

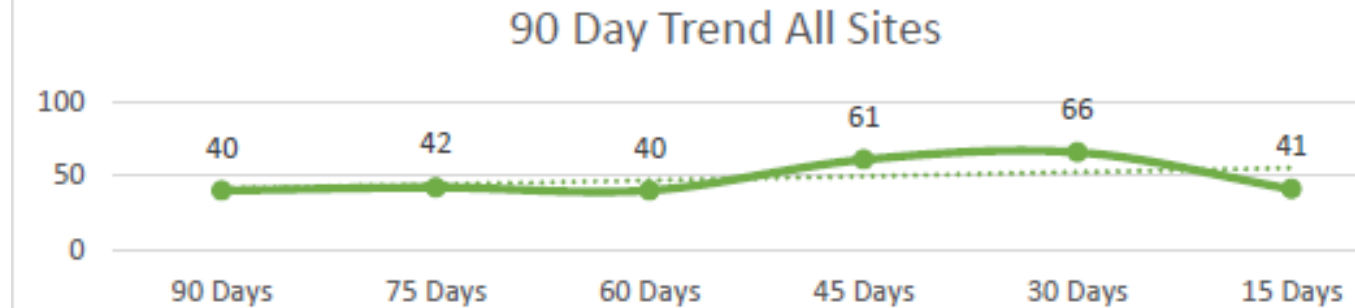
FEMA CONGREGATE/NON-CONGREGATE DATA

- 3/21/20-2/28/22
 - 8007 Individuals provided beds
 - Average age 42
 - Average nights per individual 50
 - Referrals provided
 - 6400; some examples: basic needs, rapid re-housing, employment, housing expenses
 - Services provided
 - 3818; some examples: case management, cell phone, books, food stamps, identification, housing related
