



## Emergency Shelter Task Force Charter – Revised for Phase 2

### Task Force Purpose:

The Emergency Shelter Task Force (“Task Force”) is charged by the Anchorage Assembly with recommending options for emergency shelter for the winter of 2022-2023 (approximately October to April) for adults experiencing unsheltered homelessness in Anchorage. A separate body will address immediate emergency shelter needs and provide updates to the Task Force for awareness and opportunities for alignment. The focus of the Task Force includes:

- Phase 1 – Recommendations for immediate emergency shelter sites and operations that can be implemented by September 30, 2022.
- Phase 2 – Recommendations for emergency shelter sites and operations that can be implemented in approximately 90 days to allow for demobilization of emergency shelters at MOA owned facilities that have public use impacts.

### Milestones and Deliverables:

- 8/22: Kickoff Meeting
- 8/24: Establish planning assumptions
- 9/7: Special Housing / Homelessness Committee meeting to review Administration’s plan
- 9/19: Finalize possible alternatives for recommendations
- TBD: Public engagement session(s)
- 9/21: Present draft recommendations to Assembly Committee on Housing and Homelessness
- 9/22: Present draft recommendations to COC Advisory Council
- 9/23: Facilitate Assembly work session
- 9/27: Present recommendations in writing to the Anchorage Assembly and the Mayor to include options considered, options recommended and rough order of magnitude costs and timelines.
- 10/19: Make recommendations for Tier 2 sites to come online in approximately 90 days and for demobe of Sullivan Arena.
- 10/25: Present recommendations to the Anchorage Assembly and the Mayor.

### Goals and Desired Outcomes:

#### Recommendations:

- Reduce the risk of exposure to winter conditions to persons experiencing homelessness.
- Are feasible to implement for this winter.
- Support demobilization of any emergency shelter operations established at MOA owned facilities that impact public use as soon as practical.
- The planning process supports a long-term strategy for emergency cold weather shelter and other emergency shelter situations.
- Leverage moving people to being housed.

- Will be seriously considered by the Anchorage Assembly and Mayor.
- Have public support.

#### **Approach:**

- Meetings will be open to the public via TEAMS with opportunities for the public to provide feedback, concerns and suggestions. Recordings and documentation of meetings will be posted on the ACEH website.
- Employ quality decision making principles to develop and evaluate options, review data and information and agree on recommendations.
- Agree on the parameters that define the expected emergency cold weather shelter needs including subpopulations and capacity.
- Identify multiple potential options that could be implemented to provide emergency shelter for this winter.
- Establish the rough order of magnitude costs and timelines for the alternatives.
- Agree on criteria, including consideration of best practices and local ordinances, to evaluate alternatives.
- Evaluate alternatives and develop recommendations.
- Proactively communicate and engage with key stakeholders including persons currently experiencing homelessness, local community councils, and service providers.
- Learn from the experiences of other communities.

#### **Subgroups**

The Task Force has established the following small groups to focus on specific areas:

- Facilities / Site Evaluation
- Data and Planning Assumptions
- Operations Issues / Plans
- Engagement with Persons with Lived Experience
- Communications with Public
- Tentative: Transition Planning for Demobilization

#### **Participant Expectations:**

- Participants represent a cross-section of local government and policy makers, service providers, subject matter experts, and people with lived experience.
- Participants commit to attend meetings Monday and Wednesday each week and to complete work between meetings in support of the task force objectives.
